The Political History PhD Network

Initiated after the launch of the Association for Political History in September 2014, the Political History PhD Network brings together PhD candidates working on political history. In order to strengthen good practices of international cooperation and research, it focuses on young historians who are in the process of writing their doctoral dissertation.

The Political History PhD Network issues a monthly newsletter, manages a LinkedIn-group, and organizes a yearly PhD workshop. As such the network offers an easy-accessible platform which will create a framework for future academic cooperation.

The Association for Political History

The Association for Political History (APH) has been created in September 2014 for promoting Political History broadly defined as History of Institutions, Parties, Public policies, History of Ideas or Political Cultures and behaviors.

The APH welcomes historians working from different perspectives including the most recent and innovative ones such as transnational history. One of the main goals of the APH is to strengthen international cooperation in the field of education and research, thus promoting the quality of research.

The Centre d'Histoire de Sciences Po

Headed by Marc Lazar, the CHSP exists since late 2004. The Center is the *Fondation Nationale des Sciences Politiques* contemporary history research laboratory. The Center's research activities are in line with the research activities of the Center for Twentieth-Century European History, founded in 1984.

Over the years the laboratory's researches have focused on some strong lines: 1) States, institutions, societies; 2) Wars, conflicts, violence: norms and transgressions, 19th-20th centuries; 3) Arts, knowledge and culture; 4) From local to global: international history and its scales.

The Center also includes a Center for Contemporary History Archives, conserving and classifying about 100 collections of private archives.

Location and accommodation


The workshop will be held in the room Jean Monnet and in the *Salle du Traité*, Centre d'Histoire de Sciences Po, Building S, 56 Rue Jacob. Please be ready to show your ID document for security controls when you arrive.

All the workshop locations are situated in the Sciences Po urban campus, between the 6th and 7th arrondissements of Paris.

We advise you to book as soon as possible your room at the Jean Bart Hotel, 9 Rue Jean Bart: <http://www.hoteljeanbart.com/en-GB/>.

There you will have the opportunity to benefit from the privileged Sciences Po flat rate (100,50€ per night, breakfast and taxes included). This also has the advantage of being very close to the workshop locations.

You may also decide to book elsewhere, but please note that Sciences Po can provide you with very limited funding. For this reason, we strongly encourage you to apply also for further funding from your home institution.

Travelling to Sciences Po

Sciences Po and the Hotel Jean Bart are easily accessed from the two major Paris airports and from the airport of Paris-Beauvais.

To get Paris city center **from Charles De Gaulle Airport**, take the **RER B** from terminal 1 or 2. Then, you can get off at Saint Michel-Notre Dame or Luxembourg, or else take **metro 4** at Saint Michel-Notre Dame (direction Mairie de Montrouge) and get off at Saint-Germain-des-Près or Saint-Sulpice. You can also take “**Le Bus direct**” - Line 4 – daily from 5.45am to 11pm, every 30 minutes. Tickets (€17 one-way and €30 return) can be purchased directly from the driver, at automatic ticket machines or on en.lebusdirect.com

Get off at “Gare Montparnasse” and then you can take **metro 4** until Saint-Germain-des-Près.

To get Paris city center **from Paris-Orly Airport**, take the fast train **Orlyval** from the terminals Orly Sud or Orly Ouest (approximately 9.30€), then the **RER B** to Luxembourg or Saint Michel-Notre Dame.

You can also take “**Orly Bus**”, Every day from 6am to 11.30pm, every 15 to 20 min. Tickets (approx. €6,40) can be purchased from the driver. They can be obtained from the RATP (metro) ticket offices and machines in the South and West terminals. [Buy your Orlybus ticket](#)
You will get off at Place Denfert-Rochereau. Then you can **metro 4** until Saint-Germain-des-Près.

If you land at **Paris-Beauvais Airport**, you may choose to get to Paris

- by train: <http://parisbytrain.com/paris-beauvais-airport-train/>

- or by shuttle: <https://www.aeroportparisbeauvais.com/en/acces-et-transports/navettes/>)

The shuttle will drop you off at Porte Maillot, where you can take metro 1 towards Château de Vincennes, then metro 12 from Concorde to Rue du Bac (direction Mairie d’Issy) or metro 4 from Châtelet to Saint-Germain-des-Près or Saint-Sulpice (direction Mairie de Montrouge). Travelling by shuttle will take you about 1h15 (cost: 17 €; 15,90 € if booked online).
